Coast Guard Adds New Safety Rules

With the boating season well under way this year, the Coast Guard is supplementing its safety campaign releases with a series of articles on specific items such as: equipment requirements, fire and explosion, rules of the road, and registration of boats.

This particular release is concerned with fire and explosion prevention, and it lists some protective safety measures to be taken.

The motorboat operator should be thoroughly familiar with the dangers of handling gasoline and the necessary precautions to reduce the risk of fire. He should realize gasoline explosions and fires are the predominate causes of loss of life on small power boats. As gasoline is normally used as fuel on the majority of motorboats now in operation, the motorboat operator constantly faces the hazards of gasoline vapors.
