Thirteen 4-H club members and two tired travel-worn extension agents return from the state fair at Salem and can now verify the results of the exhibits they took with them and the activities in which the 13 members participated.

Julia Smith, Gold Beach, and Mary Kenyon, Harbor, won white ribbons in their 4-H Cookery I, with four vanilla drop cookies and a record book that showed they had prepared and served meals to 217 persons; Carol Clyde, takes an exhibitors ribbon for her sponge cake. There were 90 cakes competing in this class. Menus, food purchases, and cost-figures will not be new to Sharon Jarrett and Vesper Bailor. Their well-planned scrap books took white ribbons. In the Food Preservation classes, Marcia MacDonald, Port Orford, received red ribbon for her canned fruit; Patricia Kerber, Port Orford, exhibited in Canning II which consisted of canned fruit and jams; Alice L. Bowman, Gold Beach, took a white ribbon in her Canning III project of canned fruit, vegetables, pickles and jam. Ruth Ann Porisch, Gold Beach, was one of the 92 exhibits in Clothing II. She received an exhibitors ribbon; Vesper Bailor, Gold Beach, took white ribbon for her light green wool and orlan dress; Patricia Kerber, Port Orford, received a red ribbon for her two-piece shantung. David Herron and George "Butch" Mateer received red ribbons for their exhibit which included a record book, tool chest, splice board, showing seven ways of splicing wire and a test lamp or extension cord.

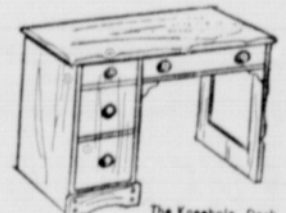

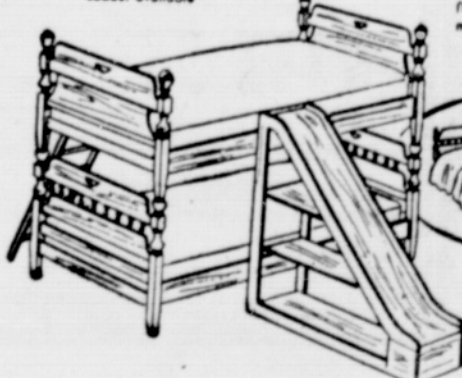

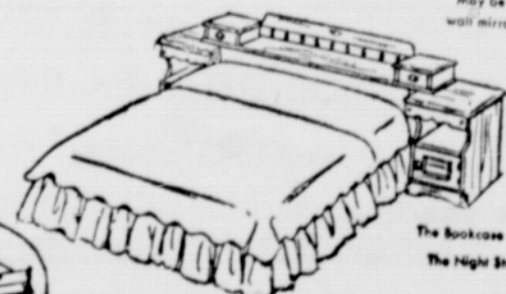
