LETTER TO PARENTS

Brookings, Oregon
October 5, 1953

Dear Parents:

Just a line to let you know what we are trying to do for your boys and girls. As you have no doubt heard we are working on the Scout building. This includes the Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorers; so you can see it is for all the children (your children) that are meeting in different and inadequate quarters and bring them to a place that is built primarily for their use. A place that will assist in character building, citizenship training and above all their obligation to God.

May I introduce the WE that are building this building? WE are the mothers and the fathers of children that are now in Scouting, that have been in Scouting and that will be in Scouting.

WE are the people of this Community that are not blessed with children but who have been blessed with great hearts that realize the benefit to our nation that Scouting has been doing since 1910, helping to mold the youth into better citizens and God-fearing people.

Since it is against the policies of the Boy Scouts of America for any real property to be owned by the Scouts it is necessary for some organization to sponsor this work. For the past two years the IOOF Lodge has been working to get this program started, but such an undertaking is too great for any one group to assume the re-

sponsibilities. Therefore, the five troop sponsoring organizations in town are to have a volunteer five man committee, each with a chairman. The five chairmen and their committeemen will be the governing body for the construction and the future control of the building.

With the number of Scout troops that we have now, this building will be in use six nights of the week. We need this building and we need your help and assistance to put it over. Please be at the next meeting at the Eagles Aerie (Jaklewicz Anchorage) next Monday night at eight o'clock.
