Brown is grading the road. By lowering the street level, the school board says they will save construction costs which would be necessitated if the street were higher than the school lot. Next step in getting the school underway is sale of the school bonds, which should be advertised soon. Architect Keeney expects to have final working plans completed by January 1, and bids for the job will be let in mid-January. An estimated 200 working days will be required to complete the building, with the school board hoping it will be ready for occupancy prior to the opening of school next fall.

Check Cases Dismissed

Two bad check charges were dismissed by Judge Dal M. King last week, as circuit court closed its first session.

The case of State vs. Roy Durham was dismissed because of a defective indictment.

State vs. Welch was also dismissed, after the prosecution requested that their case be withdrawn.

The Brookings-Harbor Walking Blood Bank performed its second errand of mercy last week, proving its value to the community once again.

Two donors who had previously been typed O positive were dispatched to Seaview hospital to furnish blood for Mrs. A. E. Stonehouse, ill in the hospital.

The two donors who volunteered were Ed Aberg and C. L. Mendenhall.

Mrs. Mendenhall has been confined to the hospital for about 10 days, with the transfusion being given Sunday.

Earlier volunteers had been rushed to the hospital to furnish blood for another Brookings woman, who has since been returned home.

In the blood bank, the number of persons typed edged slowly toward the 1,000 mark, with Dr. Ed Samuel and his staff of VFW Auxiliary volunteers still plugging away. Ed expected to reach number 1,000 this week.

Hours at the blood bank at the city hall remain the same, three to five Tuesday and Thursday, and 6 to 8:30 Wednesday night.

For Dr. Samuel, it was his fifth week of service since the blood bank was formed, without a break. Ed has taken care of typing continuously since the project was first financed by the Rotary Club.
