The picture showed the rigid training which these jumpers must undergo and the able manner in which they attack the beginnings of a forest fire before it gets a head start. Then two only can save the labors of many, followed by many when a forest fire gains rapid headway. Before the fighters are considered ready for service they undergo grueling ground training and long practice in the latest approved jump techniques. Of special interest to Oregon people is the fact that these "smoke jumpers" were flown from Montana to help check the fires set by lightning in the mountains a few weeks ago.
