In the past, a number of voters registered in Brookings have voted in the Harbor precinct, and vice versa. The practice has led to irregularities in voting totals.

Such votes will be challenged at the polls during coming elections, thus invalidating their vote.

There are two voting precincts in Brookings; and one in Harbor.

C'st Guard Checks Small Motorboats

The Coast Guard announced this week a national check to verify the accuracy of registration of motorboats.

Throughout the United States and possessions, the survey will affect owners of 377,271 "undocumented" craft, which includes all inboard motorboats and those outboards more than 16 feet in length. Of this number 27,350 craft are within the 12th Coast Guard district, which comprises the 29th, 30th, and 33rd Custom districts (Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana).

The check will be conducted by the Motorboat Registration Sections of all Coast Guard districts. Its purpose is to determine which listed U. S. motorboats remain in active status, and which others have been lost, destroyed, abandoned, or changed in ownership without proper registration.

The 13th Coast Guard District Motorboat Registration section has begun mailing form letters with questionnaire to all motorboat owners listed in its records. Prompt return of the queries will greatly expedite the report which will subsequently be made to Coast Guard headquarters.
