

## LETTER TO EDITOR

Every once in a while someone comes up with the suggestion that we should have a community building but no reference is made as to financing. It is questionable if the community would foot the bill, including maintenance.

Some years ago a small bunch (about 30 veterans, plus their ladies, earned enough money to buy a surplus mess hall, at Camp White, and then went over there and took it down, piece by piece, and paid to have it hauled to Brookings. There was then another discussion over a community hall so the veterans layed low for a couple of years, then started building what they have today and they have plans for still bettering the layout. This has all been done without solicitation of any kind. It is valued at several thousands of dollars and upon which they owe about one thousand dollars.

They early planned to not allow free use of the building and to keep rental just above actual operating costs and allow for reasonable extras. Many, many people appreciate this and make use of the hall. (Most communities, even some with "Community

Halls", would like to have a similar setup.) Because it has been made unhandy, folks may quit using it, then rates must be raised.

The owners, the local V.F.W. Post (which, with their ladies, numbers 182 members with average attendance around 60 per meeting) are really chagrined that some agency disregards the convenience and bodily safety of the thousand or so people, little and big, who are in and out of the hall every month by making any approach to it inaccessible and dangerous.

It is really too bad.

The owners are extremely sorry for the inconvenience and danger and they feel their efforts to better the community are not now appreciated.

They request the return of the Pioneer road grade to the city engineer's council-approved profile—less than a foot cut on the frontage concerned.
