

GOOSE HUNTING RULES LISTED

In answer to many questions from hunters pertaining to the regulations on goose shooting, the following clarification has been issued by the Oregon game commission.

Except Ross's geese (upon which there is no open season), the daily bag and possession limit shall be six geese including not more than three birds of the dark species. These species include the common Canada goose, lesser Canada goose, white-fronted or speckle-belly, and the tule goose. A daily bag or possession limit may consist of six snow or cackling geese or a sufficient number of snow or "cacklers" added to any of the above listed dark geese to make a total of not more than six birds.

The season on these birds extends from noon October 17 to December 30, both dates inclusive.

Among some hunters, there is confusion as to the identity of the western brant, lesser Canada, and the cackling goose. Many hunters speak of brant shooting on the McKay reservoir or at Warner valley. Actually, these hunters are shooting either the lesser Canada or cackling geese. The brant is rarely found east of the Cascades and is most common along the bays and inlets of the coast. It is a small bird not much larger than a mallard duck with a leaden black head, neck and chest interrupted only by a broken collar at the throat. They do not have the white face patch of the "honkers."

Waterfowlers are reminded that the brant season is separate from the regular waterfowl season extending from noon December 1, 1953, to February 10, 1954, inclusive with a bag limit of three brant daily or in possession.

Complete copies of the waterfowl regulations are now available throughout the state at game commission license agencies.

Deer Season Best on Record

From all indications, Oregon deer hunters have enjoyed the most successful deer season in history. Reports from all areas disclose excellent results with success in some areas running as high as 48 per cent.

All hunters tell of seeing plenty of deer, both bucks and does. The unsuccessful ones report that they couldn't hit them when they saw them, they got buck fever, or that the deer were too smart.

Damp weather conditions for the either-sex season in eastern Oregon favored the hunter and the kill was high. Initial reports indicate a high kill of antlerless deer with the majority of them being taken from lands adjacent to ranches, alfalfa and grain fields.

Although the hunting was primarily restricted to within one mile of agricultural lands in western Oregon, the success ratio in this part of the state was also high. Few hunters complained of seeing no deer.

The game commission urges all hunters to return their report cards promptly whether they managed to bag a deer or not. Information obtained from the cards is essential in designing a wise management program for the deer herds in Oregon. If the card has been lost, a regular post card is satisfactory to send the information desired, which includes days hunted, county hunted, sex of deer, antler points, and date of kill. Conscientious reporting of this information by hunters helps insure deer hunting for the future.



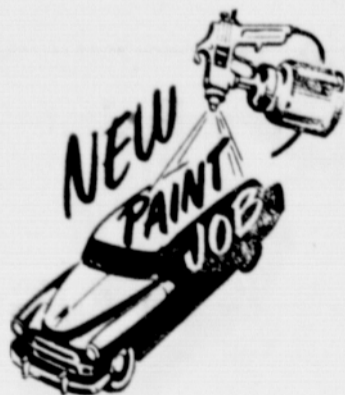


With rear and center seats removed, payload space is approximately 7 feet long and 5 feet wide.
