NOTICE OF BOND SALE NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN

that sealed bids shall be received by the undersigned until the hour of 7:30 o'clock p.m. on the 16th day of November, 1953, and immediately thereafter publicly opened by the District School Board of School District No. 17C, Curry County, Oregon at the School House, for an issue of bonds of said school district in the amount of Three Hundred Seventy-eight Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$378,500.00); said bonds to be dated December 1, 1953, and to mature serially in numerical order at the rate of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) on the 1st day of December in each of the years 1955 to 1972, inclusive and Eighteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$18,500.00) on December 1, 1973, said bonds to bear interest at the rate or rates of not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semiannually. The Bonds and interest thereon will be payable at the office of the County Treasurer of Curry County, Oregon. Bonds must be sold for not less than par value.

Provided, however, that all bonds maturing after December 1, 1968, shall be subject to call and redemption on December 1, 1968 and on any interest paying date thereafter. Notice of redemption shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation published within Curry County, Oregon, not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption.

Bids must be unconditional and accompanied by a certified check in the amount of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$7,570.00).
