

LILY GROWERS MEETING TO PROTEST CUT BULB PRICES

Lily growers of the Brookings-Harbor area will meet tonight at 7:30 at the Harbor Rod and Gun Club to protest attempted price cuts in the price of lily bulbs already delivered to market.

The meeting was called after reports from the jobber's meeting held in New York this month said that one jobber planned to pay only twelve cents for 7-8" bulbs.

Bulbs had been shipped from this area on an agreed price of 15 cents for 7-8" sizes, and many jobbers had already paid on that basis. Action of the one jobber in cutting his agreed price has thrown the market into confusion.

Basis for the attempted price cut by the one jobber seems to be his claim that 7-8" sizes are in surplus, and that his previous offer of 15 cents on a solid market is consequently void.

Local growers report, however, that there is no surplus of bulbs in any sizes, including 7-8", and

no excuse for undercutting the previously agreed-upon price.

In letters to the Jobbers Association this week, the local growers ask they hold their protests to the growers until after the meeting Thursday. At that time, growers hope they will have closed ranks to prevent cut-prices.
