## Brookings Schools Low In Cost

The audit just received from Morgan and Bertleson, certified public accountants, and auditors for Curry County School Districts, show Brookings School District 17C, low in per capita costs for high and elementary school education.

Per capita costs as shown in the audit were as follows:

School	Costs
Brookings	\$278.36
Port Orford	307.92
Gold Beach	351.17
Ophir	396.16
Langlois	403.61

The Gold Beach costs were figured by adding the total of the Union High School and Elementary School District's costs, and dividing by the total number of pupils in both districts.

This cost of operating the local school district amounts to a saving of 18,500 over the next lowest cost — Port Orford and a saving of \$78,250 over the highest cost — Langlois, on the basis of last year's attendance.
