

Highest Timber Cut In History

More timber was cut from the national forests of Oregon and Washington during the three-month period ended September 30 than in any previous quarter in their history, Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone announced today.

The 19 national forests in the Pacific Northwest region of the Forest Service reported a total harvest for this period of 828.45 million board feet valued at more than \$12 million. Previous high quarter was that of a year ago, also ending in September, when 785.72 million feet was cut. Stone attributed the increase to heightened activity in salvage of insect-killed and blowdown timber and to weather conditions more favorable for logging operations.

Oregon national forests contributed 537.63 million feet to the regional total while Washington forests produced 290.82 million feet. The three leading forests in Oregon were the Willamette, Mt. Hood, and Umpqua with cuts of 128.78, 82.66, and 73.74 million feet, respectively. In Washington, the Olympic and Gifford Pinchot forests led with totals of 96.90 and 66.22 million feet, respectively.
