The trouble begins when Louanne allows herself to be talked into having her own difficulties with the "troublesome clement" (boys). Louanne has promised to "sit" with the neighbor's infant on the same evening the girls have scheduled the blind date. Louanne's mother (Ann Ritchey) herself immersed in Girl Scout activities and a host of resultant troubles with younger sister Betsy (Janet Bailey) is against blind dates.

Mr. Miller (Lloyd Russell) angrily reminds her that he met her on a blind date 20 years ago—and look at the results: the Miller family itself!

Taking advantage of this amusing rift, Louanne charms her father into pinch-hitting for her as a baby-sitter. The unexpected results of this mistake involve the entire community and the hysterical young parents of the infant. And not one but three blind dates appear for Louanne; one of them turns out to be her ex-boy friend himself! In the midst of the growing hubbub, the girls find time to rehearse a sketch titled "If Girls Behaved as Boys on Dates."
