SIMPLE ARITHMETIC TELLS HEAT NEEDS

Worried about that room which
always seemed a bit too chilly last
winter? Thinking of correcting
the situation with some addi-
tional heating equipment this
year?

Well, to make certain you are
on the right track, why not get
some paper and a pencil and we'll
work it out just as the nation's
top heating engineers do.

Heating equipment is rated by
B.T.U.'s (British Thermal Units).
Because of differences in tem-
perature, heating experts have
worked out a BTU scale for the
United States, as shown on the
map below.

To find out how many BTU's
are required to heat that chilly
room of yours, just multiply its
length by its height by its width
to get the number of cubic feet of
space involved. Then multiply this
figure by the BTU rating for your
part of the country, as shown on
the map.

For example, if you live in Illi-
nois your rating is eight. If the
room is 12 by 15 by 8, it contains
1,440 cubic feet. Multiplied by
eight, this gives us 11,520—the
minimum BTU rating for the
heating appliance you may buy

for the room. Your dealer can tell
you which appliance meets this
requirement.

The Question Box

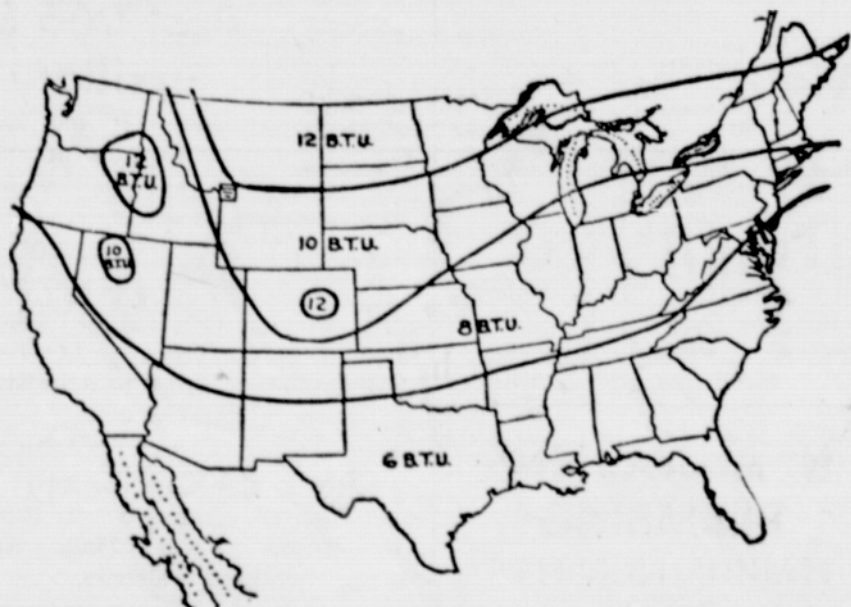
Dear Counselor:

We have great difficulty
getting uniform heat in our
living room, in which we use
a forced air room heater.
What have you found to be
the usual cause of this trouble?

Room heaters are excellent
for obtaining extra heat in a
particular room or as substi-
tutes for the central heating
system during changeable
weather. The major cause of
the difficulty experienced by
Mrs. K. M. probably is the
presence of furniture or other
obstructions in the path of
the air from the room heater.
When placing the heater in a
room, make certain it is
placed so that the warm air
it generates has a free un-
obstructed path and you will
insure uniform distribution
of the heat.
