Prices, 65c size, top diameter 8 inches; lower diameter 12 inches; depth about 8 inches. Do not bring any larger. Lampshades should be painted white.

4. Sewing Equipment: Bring all your own sewing equipment except the sewing machine and pressing equipment. Be sure pins are small and dressmaker type.

5. Other Supplies: Scotch tape, 1 small roll; seam tape-white, 1 bolt or twill tape 1/2 inch width, colorless nail polish. Yardage, 1/2 yard for 7-inch to 10-inch frame; 3/4 yard for 11-inch to 13-inch frame. Same amount of lining as outside cover. Trim, distance around top and bottom rings plus seam allowance.

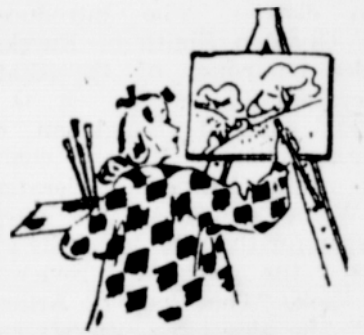
