

BRUINS TAKE PAIR OF GAMES

The Brookings Bruins were back on the victory track this week, after thumping a pair of northern opponents. The Bruins walloped Langlois 95 to 57, and followed up Friday with a 69 to 39 win over Ophir.

For Art Guthrie and his Bruins, the lop-sided wins were a welcome respite for his scanty crew. Guthrie dredged up a total of ten men and sent them all into the Ophir contest.

At Langlois it was strictly no contest. The Bruins jumped into a 14 to 6 first quarter lead, and had pulled away to a 46 to 28 margin by half-time. Guthrie used the whole squad in the second half, but the point-hungry Bruins couldn't be stopped.

By the end of the third quarter they were leading by 31 points and Guthrie cleared the Brookings bench (not a very hard job) as the two teams played on even terms in the final quarter.

High point men for the Bruins were Ray Western and Raleigh Burr, who had 13 apiece, with Dennis Phetteplace right behind them with 12. The Ophir crew was led by Truman Dinson and Stevens, with 14 apiece.

Cliff Girod's JV crew came through with their third win, thumping Ophir, 36 to 13. Charles Blair led Bruin scorers with eight.
