Pursuant to Ordinance No. 35 of the City of Brookings, Oregon, the City Council gives notice that it will hold a public hearing in the City Hall at 8 p.m. Feb. 18, 1954, for the purpose of giving all persons interested and the general public, an opportunity to be heard on a petition by E. L. Lessard to re-zone the following described property:

That certain tract of land consisting of 2.0 acres, more or less, lying in the SW 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of Section 6 in Twp. 41, Range 13 West of the Willamette Meridian, in Curry County, Oregon, described as follows:

Beginning at iron pipe "A" driven at a point 20.0 feet North and 395.3 feet East of an iron pipe marking the interior 1/4 Section corner of said Section 6; thence due East 230.0 feet to iron pipe "B"; thence due North 250.0 feet to an iron pipe; thence due East 478.0 feet, more or less, to the center of a creek; thence Southwesterly following down the center of the channel of said creek to a point on the South boundary of the SW 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of said Section 6; thence due West 541.7 feet to an iron pipe (intersecting the Northerly boundary of the right-of-way of the Oregon Coast Highway at approximately 512 feet); thence due North 20.0 feet to the place of beginning. (Intersecting the North boundary of the right-of-way of the Oregon Coast Highway at approximately 11 feet) from a central commercial district as now zoned to a light industrial district.

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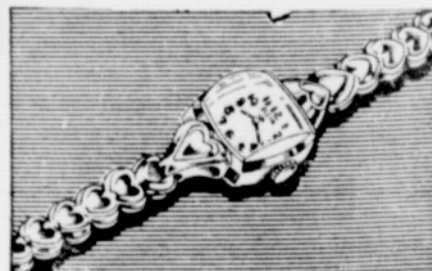
