

Brainard Tells Of Early Curry County Families

In October, 1889, Ida H. Haines closed District No. 8 Langlois school with the following pupils: Hannah, Phoebe, Eva and Nana Anderson, Dell and Helen Cope, Edith Cox, Daisy Farrier, Elizabeth, Mary and Ellen Hawkins, Emma and Stella Henshaw, Mary Haft, Maggie Prock, Amelia Long, Mary Upton, Cecil Cox, Bennie Cope, James and Alfred Haft, Charles, Andrew and Walter Farrier, Isaac Henshaw, Hans Adolphson, and Johnnie Smith.

In September, 1904, this teacher appears as being Mrs. Ida Murphy, of Los Angeles. From further notes, Ida seems to have been the daughter of Joseph A. and Eleanor Haines, and her father's name appears in a court case in the county on August 2, 1864. Joseph was postmaster at Eckley in 1901, and advertised with Shad Hudson as being in the mining and real estate business at Eckley.

Will McIndoe has come up with some information on his kinfolks. Will says his father's place was right where the present Wedderburn ranch house now stands, and adds that his sister, Lily Maria, married Ford Wood. (Ford and his brother Mark were for many years in the store business at Smith River Corners before the split-up and Mark came to Harbor.)

Will also says that Israel Morrison's wife's maiden name was Mary Miller, thought to be of Curry county. (I have no record of her.)

The Isaac Morrison mentioned as having been in the county in '58 and '64 was no kin, Will says, and that his aunt, Lucinda Morrison Unican, had but one child, Herbert. Will's cousin, Dora Ellen, daughter of Asher and Sarah Morrison Moore, passed on not many years ago, the wife of a Waterbury, one of the famous watch family, and that the James Mor-

rison mentioned in the story was none of his mother's family.

To Douglas Cooley of Brookings we owe thanks for this first telephone directory of Curry county, dated in 1912. It is typed on a letterhead of "Southern Curry Telephone Company, E. A. Bailey, President; W. J. Ward, Secretary and Manager."
