BRUINS BOUNCED FROM TOURNEY BY ILLINOIS VALLEY; TAKE FIFTH PLACE

The Brookings Bruins had a short, unhappy career in the District Tournament last week, but they salvaged fifth place from it in a consolation win over Henley.

The Bruins were soundly thumped by Illinois Valley, whom they had beaten twice, in the tourney opener Thursday, 69 to 40. Saturday they trounced Henley, 61 to 36.

Crater High School of Central Point won the tourney, beating Eagle Point in the finals, 65 to 36.

Phoenix edged Illinois Valley for third, 53 to 52.

The Cougars led the Bruins all the way through the opening game. They jumped to a 15-10 first quarter lead, and by the half had moved out to 35 to 18. The Bruins came to life in the third quarter and closed the gap a couple of points, but the Cougars were going away at the finish.

Raleigh Burr, Brookings' elongated center, was high point man for the game, with 13 points. Ken Russell had seven. Cook of Illinois Valley topped the Cougars with 18.

With the pressure off against Henley, the Bruins had a fine time. They bounced to a seven point lead in the first quarter, and made it fifteen at the half. Guthrie cleared the bench in the last half, but the Bruins kept right on going.

Ken Russell had a field day, with 20 points, and Raleigh Burr and Ray Western had ten apiece. Searcy and Hill topped Henley with eight apiece.

COUNCIL MEETS TUESDAY; TO GET CHARTER

At least two measures will be facing the Brookings City Council, when they convene for their monthly meeting Tuesday, March 9.

The City Charter, formulated by a citizen's committee appointed by the council, will at that time be presented to the the council for its approval.

The Charter, as finally approved by the council, will be presented to the voters at the May primary, and, if approved, will then become the official Charter.

Also to be heard by the council are arguments to change the zoning on property located along the east side of Chetco Avenue north of the city center.

The area concerned is now classified as tourist commercial. A. J. Christenson is petitioning its reclassification to Industrial, so that he can build a machine shop there.

The City Planning Commission has already turned down Christenson's plea. A unanimous vote of the Council would be necessary to repeal the Commission's action.

TELCO REPORTS NEW PHONES IN

West Coast telephone this week reported that it had installed 95 new phones in the Brookings area during 1953, making a total of 345.

The new installations were topped only by Coos Bay-North Bend, with 367, Crescent City with 270 and Reedsport with 119.

However, the Brookings total of 345 still lagged considerably behind other cities of comparable size or smaller. Gold Beach, with 72 new installations now has 523 phones. Port Orford has 228, including 29 new ones, and Bandon has 790. Crescent City has 1,788.

Smith River, which had 69 new installations, now has a total of 183 telephones.
