## Curry County Land To Be Reclassified

Douglas and Curry county forest land classification committees have taken action to consider classification of forest and grazing lands under the 1937 legislative act, the state board of forestry announced here today.

In Curry county, Robert M. Knox, chairman of the forest land classification committee, announced that nearly 25,000 acres would be reviewed by the committee as possible class 3, grazing, or class 1, timber, areas on March 30 at Port Orford.

In Douglas county more than 325,000 acres of former non-forest patrol areas will be considered for classification as class 2 or grazing land. Remainder of Douglas county, about 2½ million acres, will be reviewed by the committee for possible classification as class 1 or timber areas April 6 and 7.

Forest department officials advised that most of the 325,000 acres of land tentatively selected in Douglas county has never paid fire patrol assessments. These areas, made up largely of grass,

brush and timberlands, will pay in the future according to the classification given them by the committee. If classified as class 1 or timber type, the lands will pay the regular forest patrol assessment. If class 3 or grazing, the lands will be eligible for a prorated five cents per acre yearly rate. However, costs of forest fire suppression on class 3 lands are added to the five cent rate.
