Small Crowd, Big Program At PTA Meeting

A number of people missed a very important and informative program when the PTA meeting last Thursday was attended by only 45 people. Two films were shown: "Human Growth," by County Health Nurse, Dorothea Miller, and "The Inside Story" presented by Mrs. Ethel Twoby of the TB and Health Association. Following the showing Miss Miller answered questions on both subjects. A resolution approving the showing of "Human Growth" to the Intermediate grades was passed.

Fluoridation Chairman, R. A. Ritchey reported that the Executive Committee recommended study of the subject, and a panel discussion will be presented at the next meeting.

Mrs. Rod Herman, membership chairman, reported 298 members Prize for the room count went to Room 6 who served.

Mrs. Archie Hendricks, Scholarship chairman reported that the deadline for filing applications for the \$120.00 Scholarship will be April 15, and blanks are available at the High School. The scholarship may be used at any of the institutions recommended by the State System of Higher Education.

The nominating committee elected to choose candidates for next year's officers are Mrs. Lee English, Mrs. Ann Bushnell, and Mrs. John Darger.

Election of next year's officers, and also delegates to the state convention will be held at the next meeting.

Water Problems Subject of Coos Bay Conference

The state water resources committee will be listening to water problems of a five-county area at 1:00 p.m. Thursday, March 4, at the Coos Bay city hall. Counties expected to be represented are Curry, Coos, Lincoln, Douglas and Lane.

The public meeting is one of a series being held throughout the state to learn the water problems and what might be done to solve them.

Lyle F. Watts of Portland, chairman of the committee, said the group is particularly interested in local water problems of stream pollution, fish and recreation, industrial development, irrigation and drainage, and domestic and livestock supplies. The committee also seeks opinions on what should be done about small dams.

According to George H. Jenkins, floor leader for the Coos Bay meeting, everyone who has a water problem to present or a proposed solution to an existing problem will be given an opportunity to be heard.

Watts pointed out that water is one of Oregon's most important natural resources, and citizens have a responsibility to help solve its problems.

Arrangements to make a statement at the meeting can be made through Jenkins, chamber of commerce secretaries or Kenneth Priest, Curry county agent.

Findings of the state water resources committee are to be submitted to the 1955 state legislature as a proposed guide for developing water supplies.

Local Drivers Should Know California Laws

California has several new automobile driving laws which Oregon motorists should know to avoid unnecessary trouble when driving "south of the border," says General Manager Ray Conway of the Oregon State Motor Association.

Because many Oregonians drive in and through California at all seasons of the year, Mr. Conway has obtained from the California AAA affiliated this summary of new regulations.

It now is unlawful to disobey any roadside traffic sign, as well as intersection signals to regulate traffic.

Revocation or suspension of a driver's license for conviction of drunken driving provides a penalty of six months in jail, or \$500

fine, or both. This is reduced from one year in jail and \$1000 fine, or both, in order to enable lower courts to act in these cases.

Drivers must reduce car speed to 15 miles per hour while passing a school and its grounds, including any portion that may be a public utility easement, with cross walk marked, as though the area were all school grounds.

Length of semi-trailers has been extended from 35 to 40 feet; and busses 40 feet long may operate, if they have three axles.

Firemen on duty have the authority of traffic officers in establishing emergency regulations and directing traffic when no police officer is present.

The owner or driver of a runaway vehicle must comply with the financial responsibility law although the vehicle may move on its own momentum in the absence of the driver. The usual report must be made by him, as well as the vehicle hit.
