## CHAMBER HEARS HONZEL TELL OF FUTURE GROWTH IN PLYWOOD HERE

Brookings can look forward to continued expansion in its plywood industry. A. J. Honzel, Manager of Brookings Plywood, told a Chamber of Commerce audience last Thursday.

Honzel made his statement as he explained the plans that Brookings Plywood has formulated to increase production in its local plant by fifty per cent.

Earlier, Brookings Plywood had announced a new stock issue which will be used to finance a new dryer unit and core lathe here. Installation of the new equipment will raise production from three million feet per month to four and a half million feet per month.

The audience heard Honzel tell them that timber in the Brookings area will sustain production of plywood and other wood materials for many years to come. Increased local production, he said, will result in fewer logs leaving this vicinity to be milled elsewhere.

Furthermore, he said, a few years will almost certainly see the waste materials of local plants being used for wood products. Orderly growth of the local Corporation, he noted, will culminate in factories to use the waste "in the very near future."

Also heard at the meeting were

Keith Denny, of Woodbury and Company, and Harold B. Hutchinson, Portland, legal counsel for the firm.

Denny, Secretary of the Creditor's Committee of the firm, told the group that the favorable recent earning record of the company had caused the creditor's to agree to the proposed financing of the additional equipment.

Hutchinson gave the group information of the financing of the firm and its present status, and outlined the rights of the new stock issue.

Ladies of the Assembly of God Church served the dinner to the 75 members present. The tables were decorated beautifully with flowers, highlighted by Camellias from Ruth Bathiany, Harbor.

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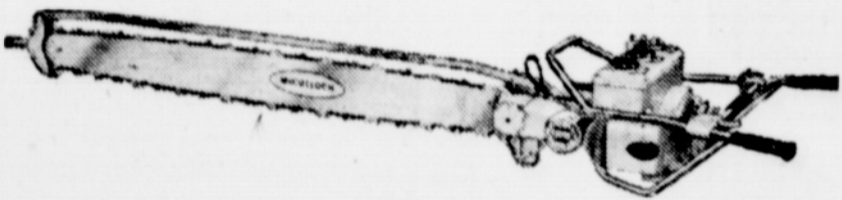
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
