

Family Living Costs Remain Same Says OSC

Family living costs for the year ahead will probably be much like 1953, according to an Oregon State college extension service circular. A trend toward stability is forecast.

Prepared by Mary Beth Minden, extension home management specialist, the publication is available at county extension offices.

Miss Minden gives planning as the cue to how individual families will get along financially. "Since goods may cost less next year and prices for services may be up slightly, we can see where the family living costs will differ according to which way the family spends," she says in the bulletin.

The home management specialist suggests home gardening, canning, freezing and selective buying as the methods homemakers can continue to use to get the best living for the family at the lowest cost.

"Balancing food supply against demand, we might conclude that prices for most foods will be down slightly," she says. Miss Minden mentions bread, shortening, rice, coffee and sugar as possibly increasing, while meat, eggs and potatoes may go down in price.

Clothing prices may decline some, she says, and furnishings and equipment will generally be down. "Watch for discounts, good trade-in values and other sales promotion schemes," she suggests. But she cautions that items reduced in price are not always the best buys when servicing of automatic equipment is considered.

"For farm families, the cost-price squeeze will continue, but it is not likely to become any worse," Miss Minden writes in the circular. For city families, she sees no general pattern. Total business activity may average about the same, but some families will receive smaller checks because of shorter working hours and shut-downs, according to the forecast.

But Oregon families as a whole can look forward to a little more money to spend because of lower taxes, providing social security payments don't pick up the extra.

The circular of information, HE 5-509, is titled "The Family Looks Ahead—1954."

DISTRICT TO VOTE ON ELECTION LAWS

School District 17c will vote Tuesday, March 20, on the question of adopting the election procedure of a first class district. The polls will open at the High School Auditorium at 8 p.m.

The local district will become a first class district on July 1 of this year, but until then must use the procedures of a second class district, which calls for elections from 8 to 9 p.m. Purpose of this election is to change the election time to 2 to 8 p.m., which is proper for first class districts.

All persons who are registered voters 30 days prior to a school election, and who have resided in a precinct or part of a precinct for six months prior to the election, and who are present at the meeting, are eligible to vote.
