Voters of School District 17C will vote Tuesday on whether to change school election procedure to that of a first class district.

If the answer the voters give is "yes," this will be the last election for which the polls will only be open one hour. The polls will be open at the school from 8 to 9 p.m.

School Board members say this is an important election for just that reason. At present, elections are held under second-class district rules, which specify the one hour voting time. If the voters change it, subsequent elections can be held from two to eight p.m. Brookings-Harbor will become a first class district in July, and the procedure will change then. But the present vote is necessary if the change is to be made in time for the next school board election.

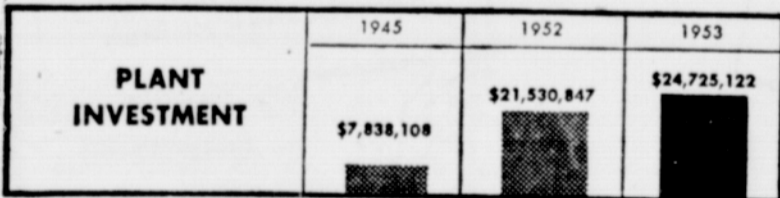


At the close of World War II, it required an investment of \$193 for each new telephone we added to our system. By mid-1952 this figure had risen to \$392. Last year costs continued to rise so that at the end of 1953 an investment of \$436 was required for every added telephone.
