

LETTER TO EDITOR

That was quite a tirade by Mr. Horn against our school directors, superintendent and school teachers. and spend our money, up to nearly a million dollars.

The decision to expell Demos was not a "spur of the moment" decision. But was I am sure, made after full consideration of all matters involved. When Mr. Horn spoke of the teachers and superintendent as he did, I wonder if he took into consideration that they have spent years in preparation for their lifes work. That they are picked by the school-board after full consideration of their character, recommendations, and past experience. So lets stand back of our school board in the excellent job they are doing. Lets back up our teachers, especially when they find it necessary to correct or punish our very own children. If our young people learn to obey the rules of their school years, how much easier it will be for them to get along with those about them in later years.
