Pete Strid, 67, of Harbor, passed away at his home early Sunday morning. He was taken to Klamath Falls Monday, by the Roy H. Brown Mortuary, for Services and Interment there Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Strid was born at Norrala, Sweden, May 21, 1886. He came to Oregon, and settled in Klamath Falls in 1927. About five years ago he and his wife moved to Harbor where he lived until his death.

He was a member of the Vasa order of America, and received his 25 year pin a month ago.

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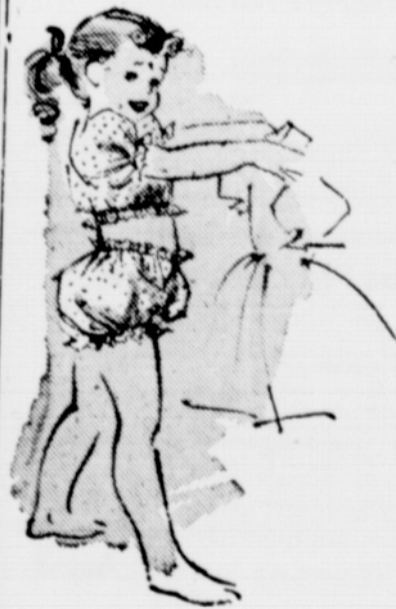
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
