Bad Check Flow May Follow New Court Decision

Local persons and business houses were warned this week to be extremely careful in accepting checks which may not be supported by sufficient funds, following a decision by the Jackson County Circuit Court on the section of the Oregon code which deals with penalties for writing bad checks.

The warning came from Sam Hall, Curry County District Attorney, who said the Jackson County Court had declared the section of the law which makes writing NSF checks a crime unconstitutional.

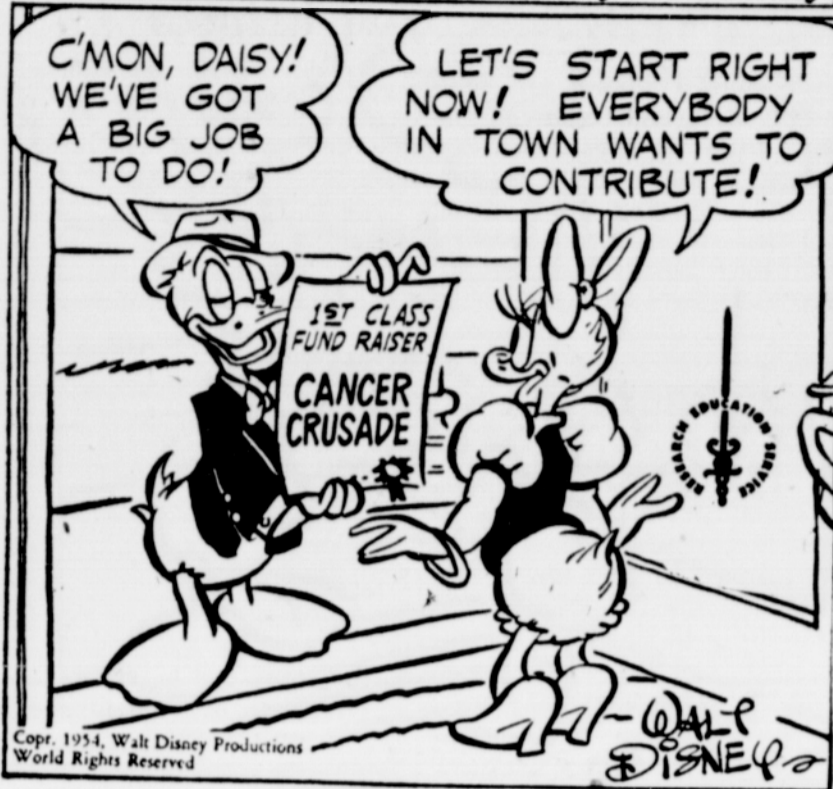
The decision of the court is being appealed to the State Supreme Court, Hall said, but the law will be shadowed by doubt and uncertainty in the meantime. Because of the fact that prosecution may be impossible, even more care than usual should be taken in handling checks from persons not well known to you.

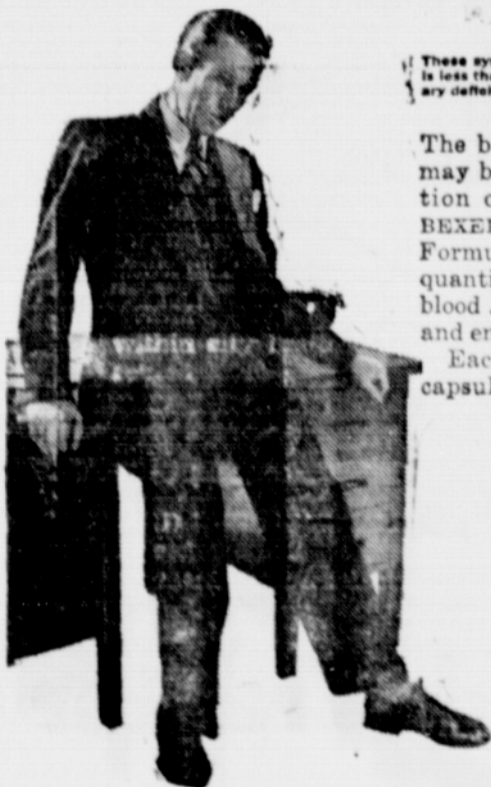

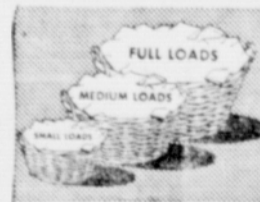

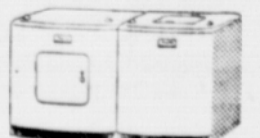
