

Governor Says Cancer Fight Must Go On

Gov. Paul Patterson gave his support to the American Cancer Society's annual crusade today, asserting that "one of the greatest fights being waged these days is against cancer, the nation's second worst killer."

"There should not be any let-up until the fight has been won," the governor stated, adding that the U. S. congress has designated the month of April as Cancer Control month.

"The American Cancer Society certainly deserves the full support of every person in the work it is doing, principally in the fields of research and education," Patterson said. "I strongly urge all Oregonians to do what they can to aid the Society in every way possible."

"Each year cancer claims the lives of many Oregon residents, bringing grief and often hardships to our friends and neighbors. We must do all in our power to stamp out this terrible disease and to this end, I want to lend every assistance of this office as well as any other offices of the State government which might be of aid."

The crusade has a two-fold objective throughout the state: (1) to raise sufficient funds to enable the society to carry on its education and research projects, and (2) to acquaint the public with cancer and its danger signals so that earlier diagnosis and treatment of many cases might result.

Medical authorities agree that many cases of cancer can be cured if they are diagnosed and treated early enough.
