Delving through my scrap book I found the following article by Eva Heffner, which expresses the things which we want you to keep in mind, much better than I could.

FLOWER ARRANGING

FLOWER arrangement is an art and follows all the art principles as in music, painting and sculpturing. There must be balance, proportion, form, line, pattern, texture, color rhythm and unity — using the living material as a medium with which to work to attain simplicity, expression, harmony and beauty. Design is the structural foundation of any arrangement and is imperative. Any black and white photograph will show the merits and faults of the arrangement, the weakness and strength of the line pattern.

Plant material should be properly conditioned for use, selected with care, keeping the picture you wish to create in mind at all times. Containers should be of a texture to compliment the plant material. Try to use a well-designed container, never one too ornate or grotesque.

Mechanical aids such as needle holders, rubber bands, twist'ems, plasticene, lead strips and many others should be used to stabilize the arrangement in the container. The finished arrangement always has these mechanical aids well concealed.

SIMPLICITY should be the keynote of any arrangement. Use spiked flowers or foliage for line, filled in with other round-type flowers keeping buds at top and outside, using open flowers and darker colors at center and at container edge. The focal point of all arrangements should be where all lines meet—that is, where the vertical line of plant material and the horizontal line of the container meet. Foliage as well as an open flower may create a transitional line, tying the two together. Never let a flower or foliage rest on the edge of the container as they must be standing by themselves. Always finish an arrangement on all sides. A good flower arrangement is three-dimensional, having height, width and depth. Do not crowd flowers into a container—know when to stop!

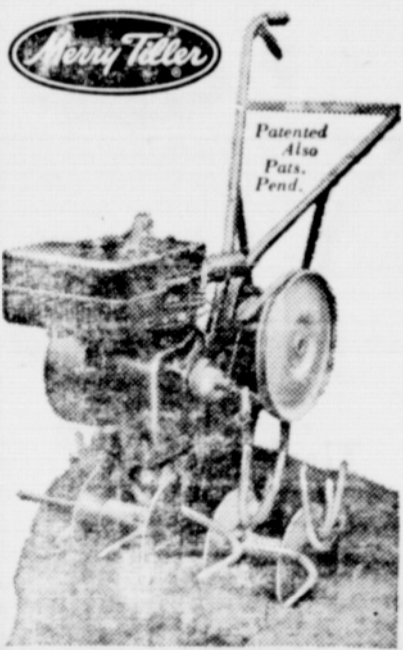
