Disabled Vets Have Special License Fee

War veterans with disabilities of 25 percent or more may obtain Oregon fishing licenses for a special fee of 50 cents, the state Department of Veterans' Affairs reported this week.

State law authorizing the special rate provides that the veteran must have been an Oregon resident for one year prior to applying for the license, and his disability must be certified by the federal Veterans Administration.

Application is made to the State Game commission, 1634 S. W. Alder Street, Portland. Veterans who received the special licenses last year need only submit their old licenses in applying for this year's. The new applicant must submit a disability statement from the Veterans Administration, and a notarized statement from one witness testifying to Oregon residence.

Forms on which to apply for the license are available from county veterans' service officers, county clerks, or the Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Library building, Salem, or State Office building, Portland.

The same 50-cent rate is available to the disabled veteran for a hunting license or he may obtain a combination hunting - fishing license for one dollar.

State law also provides that men currently on active duty with the Armed Forces may purchase Oregon fishing and hunting licenses for the regular resident fees even though they may not be Oregon residents. These licenses may be obtained at any of the license agencies in Oregon, which include offices of county clerks and most sporting goods stores. Non-resident servicemen must submit proof that they are on active duty.
