Coos-Curry Docs Schedule Meeting

The Coos-Curry County Medical Society will be host for the Southwest Oregon session of the 1954 Extramural Postgraduate Education Lecture Series offered by the Oregon State Medical Society in five centers during the week of May 17 to 21. Dr. Norman M. Harris, president of the Society announced today.

The Southwest session which Dr. Harris stated, is to be the third of the series during the week, will be held on Wednesday, May 19, beginning at 2:00 p.m. at the Coos Country Club. Sessions are to be conducted at Astoria and Corvallis on the two previous days and conclude the week with meetings at Medford and Klamath Falls.

In addition to the physicians in Coos and Curry Counties, those in Lane and Douglas counties are also being invited to attend the lectures at the Coos Bay center.

The lectures, which will be devoted to general surgery, are being presented by Dr. Frederic H. Bentley, Portland, and Dr. Orville F. Grimes, San Francisco, assistant professor of surgery University of California Medical School. Each guest lecturer will present two papers and participate in two panel sessions.

A no-host dinner for the physicians in attendance is planned between the afternoon and evening sessions.

The Extramural Postgraduate Education lectures are part of the Oregon State Medical Society's program of bringing postgraduate education opportunities to the busy physician in his home community.
