

## Flower Show Rules Given

Arrangements in your favorite container.

a—Men only.

b—Ladies who have won ribbons in any show

c—Ladies who have never won a ribbon or never exhibited before.

CLASS 10—"Pacific Containers" Arrangements in driftwood container.—Liners permitted.

a—Over 18" in length or width.

—8" to 18" in height or width.

c—Under 8" in height or width.

d—Wall Plaques.

CLASS 11—Small arrangements not over 6" high—including container—Staged in niche 9" wide, 9" high and 4" deep. Niches provided by committee.

CLASS 12—Study in combining a painting and one or two flower arrangements. Staged on book shelf 60" long, 10" deep and 64" from floor. This class is limited to 12 exhibits. Those wishing to enter must register at least one week prior to the show.

CLASS 13—Arrangement of spring blooms in any container, placed on small console table. Accessories permitted. Table to be provided by exhibitor. This class is limited to six entries and those wishing to enter must register one month prior to date of show.

### JUNIOR

CLASS 1—Class room exhibit. Farmyard Scene—Open to grades 1, 2, 3, —20"x36". Animals made from fruit or

vegetable. Prize awarded to the room having most artistic and clever scene

CLASS 2—Individuals—Open to children in 1, 2, 3 grades or younger children.

Arrangement in bright colored container.

CLASS 3—a—Flower arrangement in shell, (b) Driftwood (c) Homemade container. Open to children in grades 4, 5, 6.

CLASS 4—Same as class 3—for grades 7 and 8.

CLASS 5—Terrariums a—Children in grade 1, 2, and 3, or younger.

b—Children in grade 4, 5, 6

c—For 7 and 8th grades

CLASS 6—Aquariums.

a—Children in grades 1, 2, 3.

b—Children in grades 4, 5, 6.

c—For 7 and 8th grades.

CLASS 7—Dish Gardens—Open to children in 7th and 8th grades.

CLASS 8—Miscellaneous—All grades

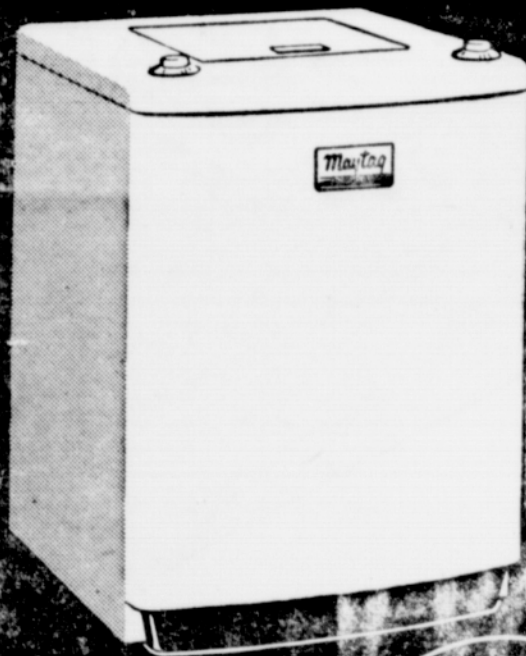
