Just get a group of ladies together anytime and hear the chatter! Such was certainly true at the Garden Club meeting last week, when the president had to wrap for order. It wasn't lack of respect; it was just pent-up enthusiasm on the approaching Flower Show at least having a chance to be released, the reason being the distribution and discussion of the printed schedule for horticulture displays and flower arrangements. Everyone was tossing questions at Mrs. Weideman, Mrs. Guy Rice and Mrs. Wollara faster than they could answer—and when a slight lull accidentally happened, everyone began on her neighbor. "Could I borrow your copper kettle for an arrangement?" "What flowers will be ready in your garden?" "My youngster can certainly make a terrarium for the Junior exhibit!" and so on.

In last week's paper is the complete schedule for the Flower Show. Clip it and save for reference so you will be sure your flowers or arrangements fall into the proper classification. Those instructions are what the out-of-town judges must follow and if your entry doesn't coincide with the rules, it cannot be considered.

The Schedule seemed to be almost the only news the Committee would give us thus far but we are assured of a beautiful stage, a wealth of color, a tea-room worth seeing and patronizing, and some excellent, original displays by the school youngsters, Grades One through Eighth, as well as display of native Arts and Crafts.

And the Art Exhibit! Ralph Vincent, former Brookings resident, will bring from Portland sixty or seventy prints by members of the Oregon Camera Club, which are the outstanding works of the past two years, all diversified subjects. In addition, there will be a collection of some twenty splendid prints in natural color, of fruit and flower arrangements done by Mr. Charles Conkling of Portland. Mr. Conkling is considered one of the greatest Color men in the United States.

This Garden Show enthusiasm was not all of the May meeting, by any means. It was launched with a charming musical program, first number of which was "Deep in my Heart" (Sigmund Romberg) sung delightfully as a duet by Mrs. Mackenzie and Mrs. Willimina Donnelly. Then followed Mrs. LaMerne Christiansen with her violin, who rendered beautifully, "Adoration" by Bodovsky. The climax came with the Azalea Singers, eleven of them, under the direction of Nell Mackenzie. For our pleasure they sang, "None but the Lonely Heart" (Tchaikowsky) and an unusual number, "Rain" (Pearl G. Curran). Mrs. Meta Myers accompanied all the numbers.

Clara Kerns talked on "Garden on the House", revealing that this title might apply to the regular, long-used and admired porch or window boxes or to the planters of brick or stone now so much used in modern architecture, to stone work outside, attached to path or steps but with the fundamental purpose in each instance that of color and charm both for the passer-by and for the resident.

From Elsa Ravekes we learned that the friendly eight inch bird we had carelessly thought to be a robin is, after all, a Towhee bird, far more friendly than the robin but of much the same coloring. The most distinguished difference is what it wears a bigger black cravat.

Answers to the roll call brought out many fine ideas of how a Garden Club can help its community. One club year is entirely too short to put into practice all the suggestions but the club can and should work toward an ideal for its city, both by example and by project.

The dessert tables were decorated with May baskets, filled with a variety of spring color. The hostesses for the day were Mrs. Glen Hurst, Mrs. C. Fallert and Mrs. John Molino.

Returning to the Flower Show plans: the crux of the discussion centered in the fact that the Committee is most eager that every resident garden club member or not, bring his or her best specimens of some type of arrangement to fit the suggested divisions. Only a few can be expert arrangers, but all can try. It is your show, a living part of the community Azalea Festival and by pulling together. It can be the best ever. There will be prizes, too—handsome rhododendrons and azaleas. Now is the time to start planning and working toward the success of your contribution, which when added to all the others will mean real SUCCESS for the whole undertaking.
