

BEAVERS SWEEP TWIN BILL FROM GRANTS PASS SUNDAY

The Brookings Beavers opened their Southern Oregon league season by sweeping a twin bill from the Grants Pass Cavemen before a large Azalea Festival crowd Sunday.

Brookings won the first game with ease by a 9 to 2 score. Big John Harbour, Caveman hurler, who had defeated the Beavers on 5 hits in a pre-season game two weeks ago, was the victim of a 4 run first inning uprising as Boyd Western, Cliff Girod, Bill McLean, Lee Goodin and Bill Darnell came thru with singles. Lone tallies were added in the 2nd and 6th, and then 3 big runs in the 7th on two infield errors and Darnell's towering homer over the road in right.

Jim "I'm a pitcher" Barrett was meanwhile proving that he can do excellent mound work in addition to being a good infielder and outfielder by scattering 7 Grants Pass hits and allowing single runs in the 6th and 8th, only one of which was earned.

Fireballer Bob Astin started and finished the 7 inning night-cap for Brookings. He was breezing along with a 7 to 0 lead at the end of 5 innings, thanks to his 3 hit hurling and 9 strikeouts, also timely hitting by the Beavers for single runs in the 1st and 3rd, a brace of counters in the 4th and 3 more runs on 4 hits in the 5th. Shaky support gave Grants Pass 2 runs in the 6th, they came up with 3 more runs in an exciting top of the 7th off 4 hits and two additional Beaver errors. The totals added to a 7 to 5 win for Brookings and a victory for Astin with 12 strikeouts.

Batting punch for the Beavers in their double triumph was "Big Bill Darnell, first baseman, with 4 hits in 8 trips to the plate, including a double and a homer, for six runs batted in. Other leading hitters were Astin with 3 for 6 and Bill McLean with 3 for 7.

Word from the north is that Drain defeated Coquille in a twin bill. Medford's Cheney Studs, due to Roseburg failing to field a team, drew a "bye. The Beavers journey to Coquille this week-end for single games Saturday night and Sunday afternoon. Next home games will be a double-header against Ray Helser's Drain club on June 13th.

Logging Mishap Claims Life of William Stone

A freakish logging accident Saturday claimed the life of William V. Stone, 28, of Brookings.

Stone was operating a tractor near Carpenterville when the limb of a tree crashed his face. He dismounted from the tractor to wipe the blood from his forehead.

At that moment a log, evidently dislodged by the vibration of the tractor, rolled down the hill, pinning Stone against the tractor. He died instantly.

Funeral services were held at Peetz, Colorado, on Wednesday, June 2. Local arrangements were by Brown Mortuary.

Mr. Stone was born October 26, 1925 at Peetz, Colorado, and came to Brookings about a month ago to work in the woods.

Survivors include his widow, Helen, and two daughters, Linda

and Sandra, all of Brookings; his mother, Mrs. Lula Stone of Peetz, Colorado; four brothers; Ralph of Brookings, Kenneth of McAlester, Oklahoma, Harold of Beaverton, Oregon; and R. B. of Sterling, Colorado; seven sisters; Mrs. Thelma Henderson of McCord Field, Fla; Mrs. Ruby Hecker of Cheyenne, Wyoming, Mrs. Dorothy Herdner of Beaverton, Oregon, Mrs. Marjorie Devereaux of Los Vega Nevada; Mrs. Veda Littler of Sterling, Colorado, and Mrs. Hazel Roberts of Pasco, Washington.
