The association's goal is to X Ray all Curry County residents over 15 years of age in its effort to detect Tuberculosis in its early stages where treatment is simpler and more effective.

The association stresses the fact that no undressing is necessary, and that the X Ray only takes a minute. There is no charge for this service. No one under 15 years of age will be X Rayed unless they have a card from the County Health Nurse requesting one.

Cause of the fire was an overheated stove. Mrs. Adams awoke in the morning after her husband had gone to work to find the wall near the stove in flames. She escaped from the cabin with her nine months old son, unharmed.

The Smith River Fire Department controlled the fire without permitting it to spread to the adjoining cabins. They were aided by the Simonsen Lumber Company's water truck, which helped supply water to fight the fire.
