BEAVERS DROP PAIR OF GAMES

Other than two thrilling ball games and added experience the trip to Coquille didn't help our Beavers any over the past week-end. They dropped both games by a margin of only a single run, 1 to 0 and 6 to 5.

The first game was a pitching duel between old pro Joe Mishesek of the Loggers and Tony Troncale of Pepperdine college in Los Angeles, newest addition to the Brookings mound staff. Mishesek allowed singles to Boyd Western and Cliff Girod to start the top of the first but the run producing hits could not be had. Bill McLean forced Girod and Bill Darnell hit into a double play. Mishesek then retired the Beavers without a single until Boyd Western singled again in the ninth.

Troncale was meanwhile also pitching a masterful game and

deserved a better fate. Dave Douglas, Logger manager and first baseman, drew a walk with one down, advanced to 3rd on Pat Rooney's drive to right and scored on Don Hinchberger's sacrifice fly to center. Big Tony scattered four hits the rest of the way and looked better as the game progressed.

Bob Astin started the second contest and was the victim of two unearned runs in the 1st, an infield error with two down causing all the damage. Coquille added two more in the 3rd. Douglas walked and stole second. Rooney was an infield out but Hinchberger hit a drive over the mound which Astin instinctively tried to stop with his bare hand and Douglas scored. This bad break may have lost Austin to the Beavers for the season as his index finger was badly injured. Jim Barrett took over and Jerry Bettendorf promptly dropped a Texas leaguer to left center to score Hinchberger.

Jerry Barrow, tough lefty from Washington State college, set down the Beavers without a hit in the first three innings but they broke thru with two runs in the 4th and 3 more in the 5th on their only 7 hits of the game to take the lead 5 to 4. The Loggers tied the count in their half of the 5th on an infield hit off Barrett's glove and a high fly that went for a hit as it dropped safely between Girod and McLean.

The Beavers could do nothing further with Bartow in the way of hits or runs and the scheduled 7 inning nightcap went into the bottom of the 8th before the Loggers could put across the game winning but unearned run. Joe

Marchand as first up was safe as Darnell threw wide to Barrett covering the bag. Harrington sacrificed and Jack Humble, pinch-hitter struck out but Wimpy Hastings singled off the shortshop's glove for his only hit of the day to score Marchand and end the game.

The Beavers take on Roy Heller's very tough Drain team in a double header on the local diamond at one o'clock Sunday afternoon.

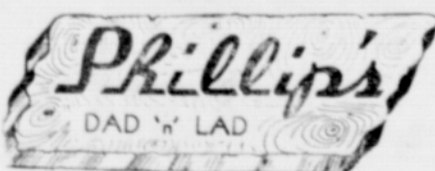
