When the Croft Association came to its end. The Lily Day was taken over by the All-Year Events Association, and here it is now.

All lily growers of the local area should do something to help with this lily day. But please don't pile any more load on the Pacific Bulb Growers Association. There probably won't be enough money in the treasury to do the work that has to be done for the Lily business in order to make it continue a money-making factor in the places where it exists.
