**ROTARIANS HEAR
TALK ON FIJI**

"Indians outnumber Fijians in the Fiji Islands", stated Miss Shaw to Rotarians, wives and guests, Monday evening at a dinner held at the Cliff House. Miss Shaw, a graduate of Bible College, Seattle, guest of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kerr, gave highlights of life in the islands, where she was born.

To develop the sugar industry in her colony, England sent Indians to the Islands, 200 of which are now used for the production of food. Only 100 of the 300 South Pacific Island group are inhabited. The Indians, multiplying more rapidly than the Fijians, now outnumber the natives. The Indians, wishing self government cause a state of unrest and unfriendliness between the two factors. "The Fijians, although once cannibalistic, are now a friendly, peace-loving people," said Miss Shaw.

Archie Hendricks, one of the 2000 from 59 different countries attending the International Convention held in Seattle June 6 to 10, gave a resume of activities there. Others from here attending were Mr. and Mrs. Earl Breuninger, Mr. and Mrs. George Funk, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kerr, and Mrs. Hendricks.

Les Dimmick was presented the president's pin by Gordon Coetz, retiring president. Roy Brown, with stories, and Fred Moore, in charge of the Pig, furnished humor during the turkey dinner. Decorating the tables were roses, carnations and candles. Dancing and singing accompanied by Roy Weideman at the organ concluded a pleasant evening.

Carol Ann Benson was the Princess from this section last year and she reports that she had a very wonderful time.
