Lumber Strikes Have Minor Effects Here

Lumber strikes, which are being felt over large sections of the Pacific Northwest and northern California, still had not touched Brookings this week, but their effect was being felt locally.

A few logging operators who had furnished logs to strike-bound Crescent City mills were curtailing operations in this area, as mill

ponds of the idle mills filled up.

However, most operators were marketing at least a part of their normal output to other mills which had not been struck. And Brookings mills which had been hard-pressed to find an adequate supply of logs now reported there were plenty available.

Locally, there were still no moves to shut down mills, and none are expected. Fears that lumber from this area might have difficulty in being transported had also proved groundless to date.
