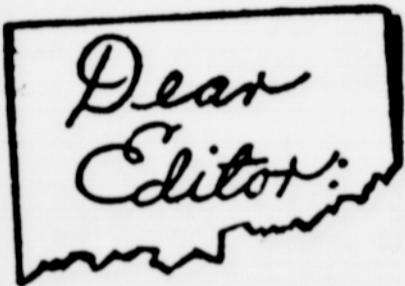

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1953 Sees One Million Tourists In Oregon; State's Third Largest Industry

During 1953, 4,215,456 families from all over the United States vacationed in the Pacific Coast States of Oregon, Washington and California.

Figures available from a recent comprehensive survey, indicate that the average family consisted of three persons, which would represent to us an approximate influx of 12,650,000 persons.

Figures further indicate that these same persons stayed an average of six and one half days and spent approximately \$150.00 cash during their stay, or a total of \$1,897,000.00; no mean sum, in any man's language.

We are informed by our very capable State Travel Information Division, Carl Jordan, (director that over One Million out of state visitors came to Oregon last year and they left over \$125,000,000.00 in new money, thus making the Tourist Business, Oregon's third largest industry.

Assuming that we here on the Coast were the recipients of only about 15 per cent of this business, which could be small compared to the area available for vacationing pleasure, it would reflect a gross of \$18,750,000.00, or almost two and three quarter millions of dollars in new cash business for each county on the Coast. This of course is not reflecting the Ore. Vacationist, who comes to the Coast from the many cities and towns of the Willamett Valley, and other adjacent areas.

Many local areas of our great scenic wonderland, have asked for, and had conducted, comprehensive surveys looking toward industrial

development, and invariably, the recommendations have laid great stress upon the recreational facilities available, and the possibilities, of developing new potential and satisfying gross, by stimulating enthusiasam in that category.

Your local Chamber of Commerce, Commercial Club, or other booster organizations, merit your support, in their effort, and discussion with members of these groups, who are cognizant of the terrific potential of this industry, will be a most interesting revelation to those not so acquainted.

Another agency, who recognizes the value of this industry to the area, is the Oregon Coast Association, which was established over thirty years ago, by the same pioneers who had this great Coast Highway built, and for that same period has been in the front in publishing the wonderfully air conditioned scenic value of the great Empire the highway serves.
