Mr. and Mrs. Barney Barthouse of Ashland spent the recent weekend here with Mr. and Mrs. James G. Smith.

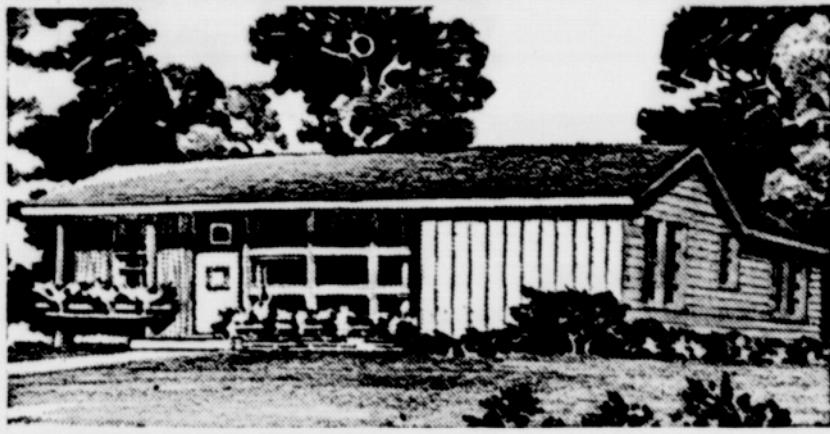
A. L. Hall was able to be brought home Friday from the Curry General Hospital. His feet, which had been infected are greatly improved with much of the swelling having been reduced.

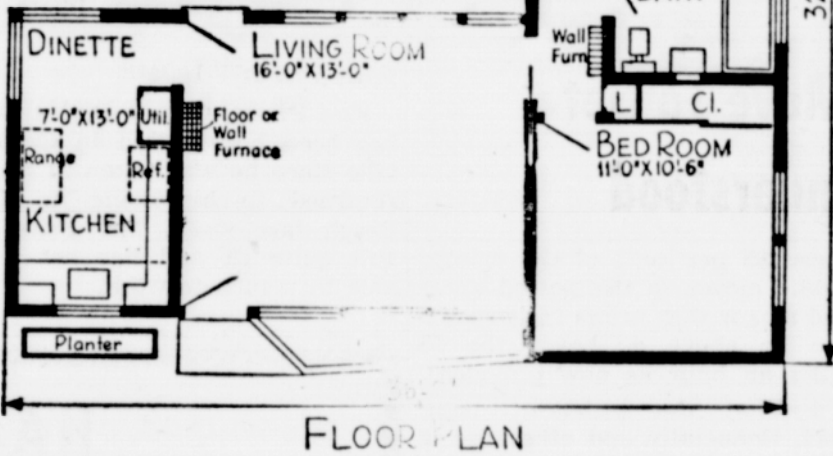
