

Neuberger, Cordon Votes Compared

Strategists from the camps of Senator Guy Cordon and Candidate Richard L. Neuberger have been going over results of the primary election with the proverbial fine-tooth comb. They hope to come up with clues to strategy for the fall campaign.

As could have been expected, both sides are claiming satisfaction from the primary figures.

Republicans note that Senator Cordon beat Neuberger by 33,453 votes statewide, took 20 of the 36 counties and polled a higher percentage of the Republican vote than Neuberger did of the Democratic vote. — 41.8 percent as against 34.8 percent.

Neuberger's backers have been publicizing the amount of the write-in vote: 1,495 on the Republican ballot, 322 on the Democratic ballot.

The actual vote count in the state was 164,988 for Senator Cordon, 131,535 for Neuberger. This means that Senator Cordon led Neuberger by more than 11 percent of the total vote.

Democrats point out that they had no active contests on their ballot to attract voters, but that the Republicans had two such—the gubernatorial battle between Governor Paul Patterson and Secretary of State, Earl Newberry and the Third District congressional fight between Tom Lawson McCall and Congressman Homer Angell.

WOMEN OUTNUMBERED

The final breakdown on the newly completed Census in the City of Brookings showed about 100 more males than females within the city. There were 1,189 males to 1,084 females.

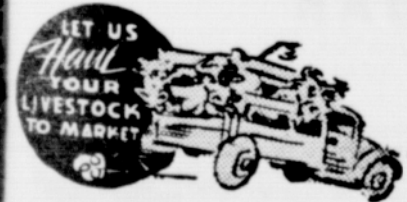
