

## BEAVERS SPLIT WITH COQUILLE

What looked like an apparent double defeat at the hands of the Coquille Loggers turned into an even split as the Brookings Beavers really pulled a game out of the fire by scoring 4 big runs in their last turn at bat in the seven-inning nightcap on the local diamond Sunday. Coquille had defeated Brookings 8 to 6 in the 9-inning opener.

The second game had been a pitchers' battle between Beaver Jim Lehl and Jerry Bartow of Coquille. Brookings scored a single run in the first inning and the Loggers evened the count with a tally in the 6th. Coquille then put over 3 runs in the top of the 7th, for a supposedly safe 4 to 1 lead.

The Beavers however were not to be denied. Tony Troncale, batting for Len Reynoldson, beat out an infield hit to second to open the lucky seventh and Frank Burdell followed with a single to right. Bill McLean, pinch-hitting for Lehl, struck out but Cliff Girrod loaded the bases as third-base man Kirkendall juggled his ground ball. Boyd Western then drove a hard single over short to score Troncale and Burdell. Jim Johnson skied out to deep center but Bob Selsor put the finishing touch to the rally by unloading a long double to right to put Girrod and Western across the

plate for the tying and winning runs.

A big rhabarb followed with the Coquille players contending that Western was out at the plate. Umpire Al Walsh however ruled that catcher Roy Harrington had dropped the relay throw from the outfield. The umpire's decision was of course final.

The Beavers made 15 hits off Joe Mishesek in the first game, enough to win most contests. Beaver starter, Tony Troncale was however having one of his rare "off" days. The Loggers touched him for 2 runs on 4 hits in the 1st, a single in the 3rd and then 3 runs in the 6th on Dave Douglas' home run over the road in right. Jim Kelly came in as relief at this stage of the game to squelch the rally.

Brookings got back into the ball game with 3 runs in the 4th and 3 more tallies in the 6th to tie the score. The Loggers broke thru again for a run in the 7th on a walk, sacrifice and a lone hit to break Jim Kelly's string of scoreless relief hurling at an even 14 innings. Coquille added a final but needless run in the 9th.

The Beavers had two more good scoring chances. They loaded the bases in the 8th with no outs but couldn't take advantage of the opportunity.

Jim Johnson and Bob Selsor hit successive singles with one down in the 9th, but the Logger pitcher Jerry Barton worked himself out of a jam.

Leading Beaver hitters for the day were Bob Selsor with 6 hits in 9 trips to the plate. Jim Johnson and Bob Astin each with 4 for 8 and Frank Burdell with 3 for 6.

Grants Pass defeated Medford twice over the week-end thus dropping Brookings into last position in the league standings. The Beavers now face a tough job to gain 4th spot in order to make the post-season league play-offs. They face Roy Helsing's Black Sox at Drain this coming Saturday and Sunday, and then the final double-header here against Medford's Cheney Studs on Aug 8th.

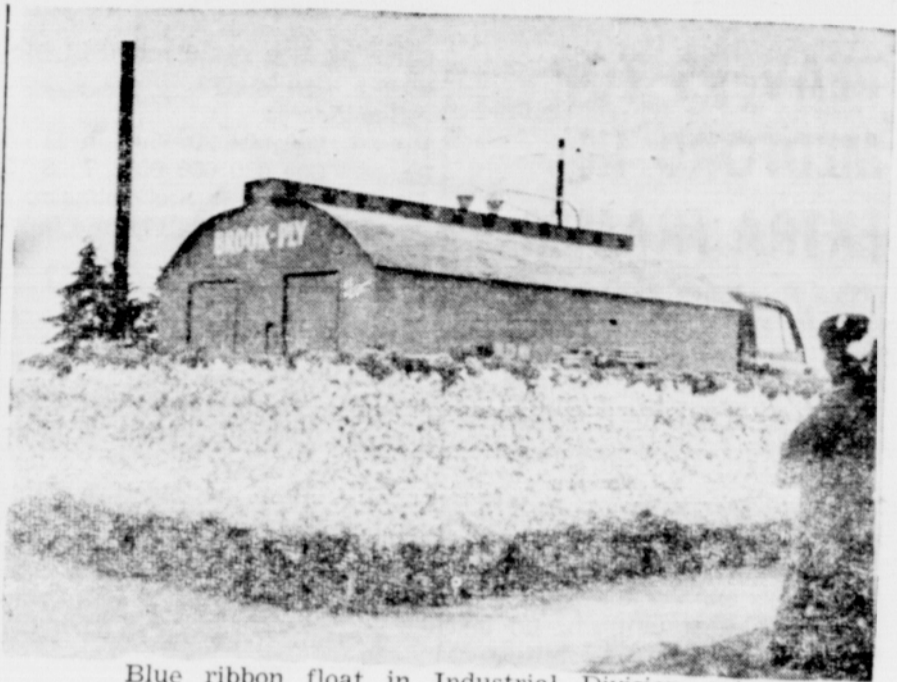
## Travel Editors To Visit Brookings

These editors bring untold thousands of dollars into our state by the many articles they write on the impressions they have receive while in our state.



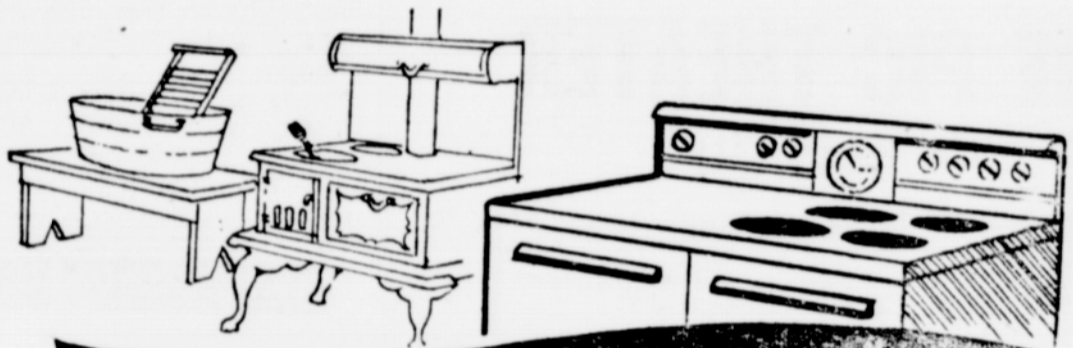
Blue ribbon float in Industrial Division entered by Brookings Plywood.

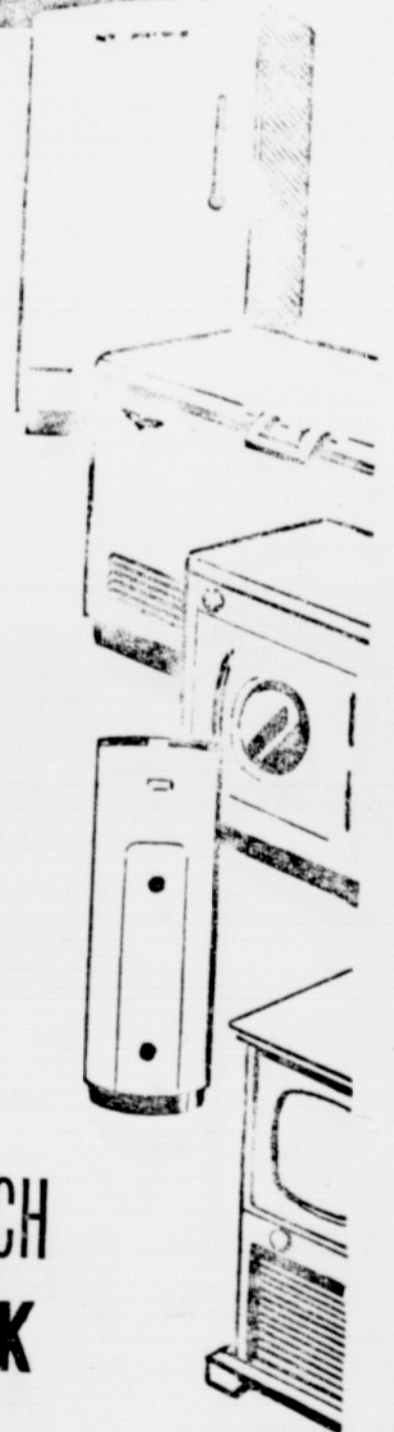
### DITCHEYS HAVE GUESTS
