

BEAVERS LOSE TWO SLUGFESTS

The Brookings ball club just cannot seem to get hitting and good pitching at the same time. This past week-end at Drain they slammed out a total of 26 hits good for 18 runs, yet dropped both games by scores of 11 to 8 and 12 to 10. The hurling was "way off"

at the start of both contests and the fielding was very shoddy to say the least.

The Beavers started the Saturday night game like champs getting to Del Coursey for 4 runs in the 1st frame on a double by Lee Goodin and singles by Barrett, Selsor and Astin. Drain retaliated immediately in their half by driving Tony Troncale to the showers with 4 runs charged against him. Jim Kelly retired the side but ran into difficulty of his own when the Black Sox tagged him for 4 runs in the 2nd. They also added 3 runs in the 4th, only one of which was earned. Kelly retired Drain in the last 4 innings but the damage was done.

The Brookings hitters continued to shell Del Coursey quite freely, getting 2 runs on singles by Selsor, Johnson and Astin in the 3rd and 3 final runs in the 6th on Lee Goodin's long 2-run homer over the left field wall and Selsor's hit to score Girod who had been safe on an error. Coursey blanked the Beavers in the last 3 rounds to squeak thru for the 11 to 8 victory.

The Beavers loaded the bases with two down off ace Carl Wickham in the 1st inning Sunday afternoon but could not score. Then came the night-mare inning of the season for Brookings as the Black Sox scored 9 runs in their half, only two of which were earned. Lefty Jim Lehl who had previously made two fine showings on the mound for the Beavers plainly didn't have it Sunday. He allowed 3 hits and walked 3 batters, which plus 4 Beaver errors brought in 5 runs. With the bases still loaded, Tony Troncale took over and allowed 2 hits for a 4 additional runs to make the big total of nine. \$3200 Research Grant Awarded To Forest Lab

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—In support of its testing program, to help design buildings for greater resistance to earthquake, wind and blast forces, the Oregon Forest Products Laboratory has received \$3200 from the California state division of architecture.

The Laboratory's testing program on wood roof and wall diaphragms started in 1950 and has included tests on 38 quarter-scale wall and roof panels and 10 fullscale roof diaphragms. Tests have been of value to structural engineers and architects.

designed wood-frame buildings have remarkable ability to resist wind and earthquake forces, laboratory researchers said. Wood buildings have more "give and spring" than other types of construction.

This summer's work at the laboratory will include tests to learn how well mullions, wooden separators between windows, stand up when used in different sizes. Laminated 3-inch roof deck and roof panels of four length-width ratios will also be tested. Douglas Fir lumber is being used throughout. The Laboratory is a state-supported research agency located on the Oregon State college campus.

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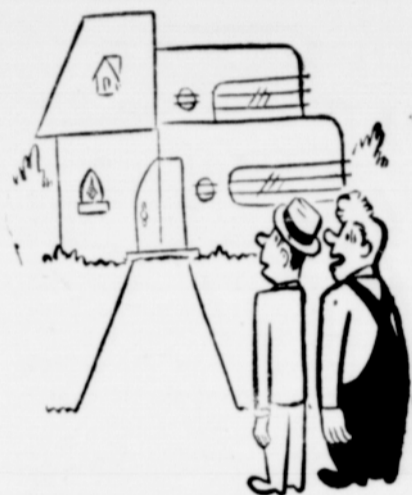
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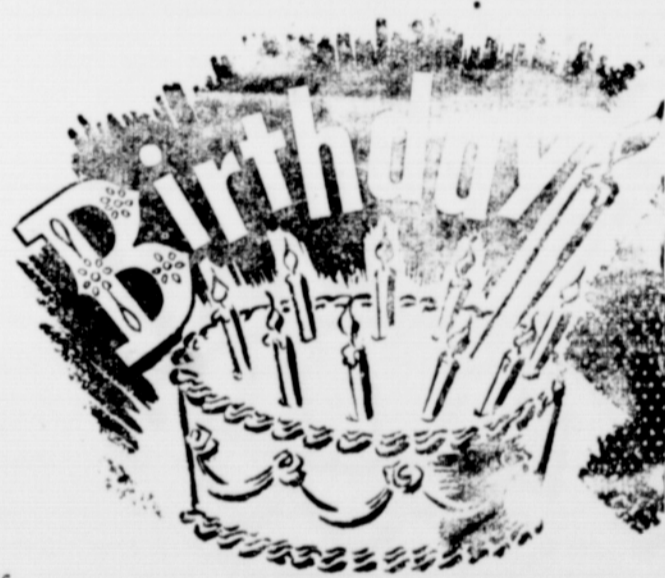
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
