Brookings Woman Fined For Door To Door Sales

Mrs. Anna Moulton of Brookings was fined \$20.00 and sentenced to 10 days in jail, Friday, for violation of the Green River ordinance, which prohibits door to door sales. The jail sentence was suspended by Judge Hans Nelson.

Mrs. Moulton was arrested on two complaints signed by a City official, Recorder Gladys Kanick. The second complaint, for selling without a license, was dismissed by the Judge with the consent of the plaintiff.

Earlier, Mrs. Moulton, a representative of Minnesota Woolen Mills here, had attempted to purchase a license from the Recorder, and had been refused one under the Ordinance.

Arrest of Mrs. Moulton was carried out Thursday evening, and she spent the night in jail, rather than pay \$50.00 bail.

Setting of the fine at \$20.00 by Judge Nelson may have prevented Mrs. Moulton from carrying the case to a higher court on appeal, since the Constitution provides the right for cases only where the penalty is in excess of \$20.00. Mr. and Mrs. Moulton say
