Savings Bond Sales Show Big Increase

Sales of U. S. Treasury Savings Bonds in Curry county and the State of Oregon for the month of July showed a sensational rise, and far exceeded those of any other July since the late 40's. Total state purchases of the Treasury's E and H Savings Bonds for July on this year amounted to \$3,777,126 as compared with \$2,209,735 for the same month a year ago.

The people of this county invested \$170,761 in purchases of Savings Bonds to help make the state record, compared with \$7,432 last year.

Sales for the first seven months in Oregon are up 20.7 percent over the same period in 1953. While national sales are up twelve percent.

The sensational increase in Oregon's July sales came as a pleasant surprise to Savings Bonds authorities, in the face of the present lumber strike. According to Mr. E. C. Sammons, chairman, Oregon Savings Bonds Committee, the fact that H Bond sales more than doubled their best previous showing might stem the present attractiveness to investors of this security, with its semi-annual interest check and high rate of return, plus the steady increasing number of Oregonians who are familiar with it.

He expressed the opinion that the lumber strike has dramatized the need of personal financial reserves for emergency purpose, which could account for the increase in E Bond sales instead of the expected drop.

For your individual contribution in removing fish from the lakes may not amount to much in terms of reducing the overlarge populations, but you can enjoy the privilege of trying.

The problem at Tenmile Lake is one of reducing the catfish and perch populations in an effort to balance the number of fish with the food supply. Whether or not this can be done remains to be seen.

In any event, the fish are there waiting for the anglers, so don't forget Tenmile Lakes when you get the urge for some pan sized catfish or perch.

Archers Require Hunting Permit

Hunters who plan on stalking big game with bow and arrow this fall are reminded that this year archery permits are available only at the game commission headquarters in Portland or at the five regional offices. They are not available at the usual license outlets.

Regional offices are located at Route 1, Box 325, Corvallis; Box 977, Roseburg; 222 East 3rd, Bend; Box 8, Hines, and Box 741, La Grande. The Portland address is Box 4136, Portland 8.

Requests for permits can be made through the mail, and permits are issued free. The only information necessary is the name and address of the applicant.
