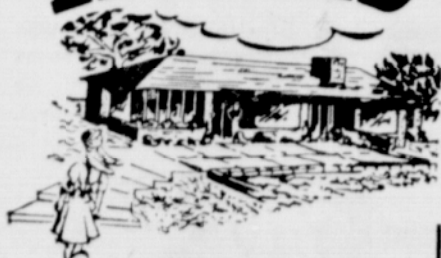


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Coos-Curry Museum To Be Open Each Week

The Coos-Curry Museum will be open each week to the public on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 1 to 3 p. m. The attendants will be Mrs. Ralph Stephens and Mrs. Mary Randleman.

At the monthly meeting of the Coos Curry Pioneer and Historical Association held Saturday, August 14th, the question of hiring a caretaker was taken up but due to the shortage of reserve funds and to the small attendance at the meeting, the proposal failed to carry, but Mrs. Ralph Stephens and Mrs. Mary Randleman have agreed to render their service without remuneration. The museum is located on the Community Building grounds and contains a large number of very interesting articles, pictures etc. of olde days.

The Museum Committee reported that the grounds had been cleared surrounding the building by the removal of the myrtlewood stumps, grass etc. It was also stated that the custodian of the community building with lumber made available through George Burr, had built book shelves and banisters on the porch.
