

## 24 Billion Feet Of Lumber Is Cut In Northwest

Timber amounting to 2.4 billion board feet was cut on the 18 national forests in Oregon and Washington during the fiscal year ending June 30, Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone said. This is the second highest volume of timber cut for the Pacific Northwest Region, exceeded only by last year's record. Value of timber cut during the current fiscal year just ended—\$33,966,677—is a decrease of \$3,658,586 from the previous fiscal year. Also, total net receipts were lower.

The 10 percent decrease in the value of timber cut reflects generally lower stumpage prices brought about a change in market conditions as well as by lower prices received from scattered tracts of windthrown and beetle-infected timber which were more costly to log.

Net receipts of \$310,872 came from the grazing of livestock, land and power uses. The total net receipts of the 18 national forests from all sales and uses exceeded expenditures for operation, maintenance, and development by nearly \$20,750,000. A substantial share of the expenditures was invested in permanent improvements such as reforestation, range reseeding, buildings, and road construction. Mr. Stone pointed out that in addition to the cash values received from national forests many intangibles are contributed to the local welfare. Such vital resources as water, recreation, and wildlife are good examples, he said.

Individual sales contracts and permits numbering 4,060 accounted for the total income from forest products and timber cut during the year. In the two states, 65 percent of the sales amounted to \$500 or less while 83 percent were for \$20,000 or under. Forest sales other than timber totalled

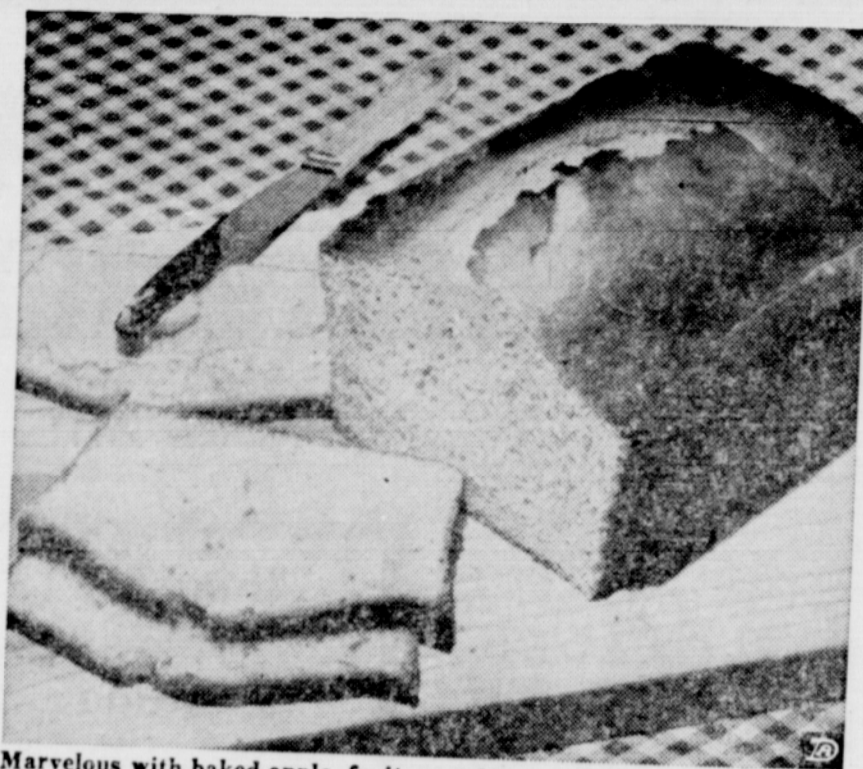

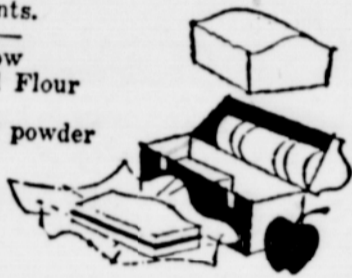

#### TOASTED COCONUT LOAF (Quick Bread)

Sift flour before measuring.  
Use level measurements for all ingredients.  
Sift together into a large mixing bowl—  
3 cups sifted Sperry Drifted Snow  
"Home-Perfected" Enriched Flour  
1 cup sugar  
3 teaspoons double-action baking powder  
1½ teaspoons salt

Add—  
1½ cups toasted\* coconut (4 oz. can)  
1½ cups milk  
1 large egg, unbeaten  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Stir vigorously until ingredients are blended. Turn batter into a greased and floured large bread loaf pan, 9½ x 5½ x 3 inches. Bake in a preheated moderate oven, 350°, for about 1 hour 10 minutes. When baked turn onto a wire rack to cool thoroughly before storing. Cut in thin slices and serve plain, toasted, or buttered. Makes 1 loaf.  
\*Toast coconut in a shallow pan while preheating oven. Stir frequently to insure an even golden brown color. Cool before using.



### SCHOOL BIDS ANNOUNCED

A special meeting of the Brookings-Harbor school district No. 17C was held in the high school at 7:30 p. m. on August 26. All members of the board, the Clerk, and school superintendent, Lynn Hampton, were present.

The purpose for the meeting was to open sealed bids on the supplying of; Gasoline, oil, tires, and other maintenance materials for the school buses, fuel oil for the school buildings and the servicing of the towels.

Richfield with a low bid of 27.5 on regular, and 29.2 for ethyl was awarded the gasoline contract.

Richfield, again with a low 30 cents a quart was awarded the oil and lubrication contract.

The Eureka Oil and Burner Company was awarded the fuel oil contract on the basis of low bid of \$3.45 a barrel, delivered.

The Brookings Laundry received the towel contract at a bid of .04 a towel.

476 and produced \$50,252 of revenue.

Leading the region in value of timber cut for the fiscal year just ended was the Willamette national forest in Oregon with \$5,909,440. Second was the Olympic forest in Washington with \$4,310,593. Other forests exceeding the \$2 million mark were the Mt. Hood and Umpqua forests in Oregon, and the Gifford Pinchot and Mt. Baker forests in Washington.

After passing on the bids, the board heard a report by Mr. Hampton. This report had to do with the schedule for the coming school year and a proposed policy of board and administration functions.

On the recommendation of Mr. Hampton the board decided to hire a special teacher for slow and retarded learners. This instructor would be hired on a part time basis or a period of one year. The State Board of Education recommends very strongly that a special teacher of this type be employed. Both the state and county pays part of this salary.

The board also took action in the affirmative on a proposed reorganization of committee work. Mr. Rapraeger, who was assigned the job at a previous meeting, presented the plan of reorganization to the board.

It was decided to meet every second Tuesday of the month, starting September 14, insofar as regular meetings during the school year are concerned.
