Agencies Report On Oregon Manufacturing

The survey of Oregon's Manufacturing potential which started last month already is bringing results, according to reports made by state agencies to Governor Paul Patterson.

Material needed by several different industries here has been found available from nearby operations, saving considerable waste and inefficiency in handling, according to those in charge of the study. Considerable progress also has been made through federal agencies in bringing Oregon operations to the attention of those handling defense contracts. Many plants around the state, it has been found, already have equipment to handle these needs, while others may be easily converted.

"We have only started this study but, from results already reported, we know we are on the right track," commented Governor Patterson. "As the material is analyzed, we are sure that it will help increase output and will provide many more jobs for Oregonians."

Information supplied by many of the 4,130 plant owners being contacted by representatives of the State Unemployment Commission is being used to help established industries build up operations here. Other agencies already actively co-operating in the continuing program include the Oregon Development Commission and Small Business Administration.
