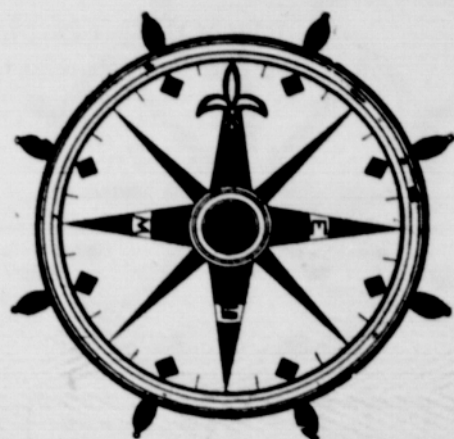

Four More Enter City Campaign

BRIMM TO RUN IN MAYOR RACE

The political pot in Brookings is boiling at a rapid rate this week, as four more candidates tossed their hats into the ring.

Petitions were taken out for Roy Brimm for mayor this week, along with three council candidates, C. F. Campbell to succeed himself, Gordon Olsen, and Gordon Goetz. None of the petitions had been brought back to city recorder Gladys Kanick's office as of press time Wednesday afternoon, but no trouble is anticipated.

The mayor race has opened up now with two candidates, Brimm and Warren Smith opposing each other. The men were one time business partners. Smith's petitions were returned last week.

The present mayor, Bob Dimmick, will not be running for reelection this year. He was first elected in 1951, and has served in that capacity since the city was first incorporated.

Two other councilmen will still retain their office. They are Clive Manley, and Pete Lesmeister. Campbell has been on the council, and just recently signified his intentions of running again.

NEW UNION OIL STATION TO OPEN

A building permit for a new service station has been taken out by the Union Oil Co. at an estimated cost of \$15,000. The permit was taken out this week at the city hall, with construction to start soon.

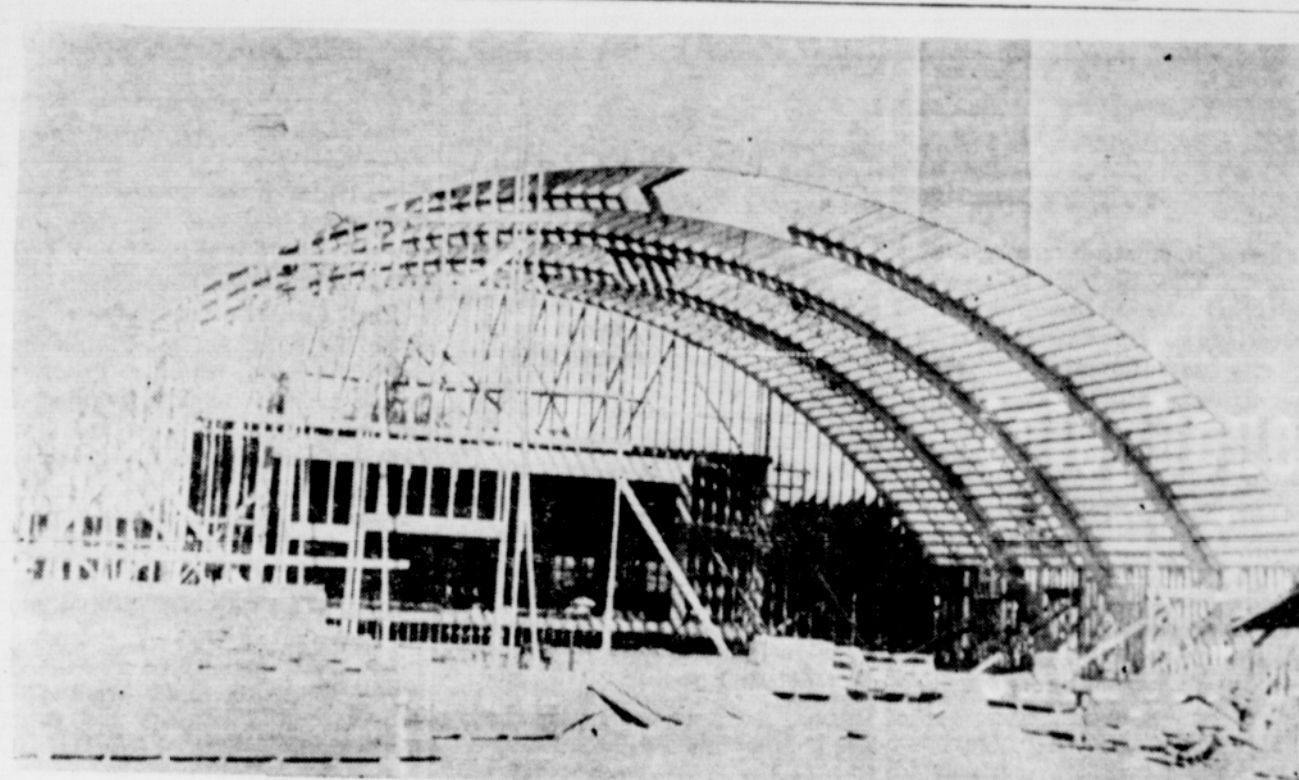
The station will be located north on highway 101, adjoining the C. Ed Dempsey property.

MUST REGISTER BY OCT. 2

October 2, is the last day to register for general election November 2nd, according to word received here by Oleta A. Walker, Curry County Clerk.

Any elector who may complete his residence or become 21 years of age by November 2 may register. Any woman who has changed her name by marriage should reregister.

Total Enrollment Is Over 800 Here

The first day totals for the Brookings-Harbor school show that 801 youngsters registered for the current semester.

Superintendent of schools Lynn Hampton said that the enrollment figure was up 48 from last year. However the total would have been a lot more but a bus load of Catholic children are attending a parochial school in Crescent City this year.

In a figure breakdown, by classes: First grade, 97; second grade, 94; third grade, 67; fourth grade 73; fifth grade 67; sixth grade 74; seventh grade 62; eighth grade 70. for an elementary total of 604.

In the high school there are 63 ninth graders, 60 sophomores, 44 juniors, and 30 seniors.
